Collection Center

Membership

History San José's Collections and Exhibitions team curates and cares for the over 130,000 pieces in its collection, including the Research Library & Archives, most housed in the 45,000+ sq ft warehouse located across from History Park. This year, we accepted over 50 new donations, including the personal papers of LeRoy Brant, the Restaurant Tsugaru neon sign, and San Jose Earthquakes collectibles.

Did you know... you can experience almost 90,000 items from History San José's collection online? These include photographs, home movies, vintage postcards, one-of-a-kind objects, and more.

Collection Highlight: Farmall Tractor



Volunteers in History San José's Restoration Shop restored a 1951 International Harvester Company Model F-Cub tractor this year. The tractor was donated to the museum in 1990 by Jim Wasano. Now in working condition, it is used as part of HSJ's public programming.

The newest building to arrive at History Park is the Southern Pacific Coyote Train Depot, which was moved to the park in May from its location south of San José. The depot was built in 1869 as part of Southern Pacific Railroad's initial line between San Jose and Gilroy, and supported the extensive farming population in the Coyote Valley.

History San José continues to add new experiences for our over 200 members. Along with our annual events like the afternoon teas, Cars in the Park, and Children's Holiday programs, we continue to create new activities, including the Bay Area Glass Institute workshop and specialized walking tours of History Park, enabling members to find new ways to explore History San José.

The most popular member exclusive event remains the Red, White, and Blue Member's Picnic. This year saw over 100 members and their guests visit, take part in our crafts, enjoy ice cream, play family activities, have a relaxing picnic on the quiet grounds, and watch the fireworks show courtesy of the San Jose Giants.

Education

History San José catalyzes curiosity for thousands of young learners each year through our nine immersive field trip programs. In the 2023-2024 school year, our Education team engaged over 10,000 students, including 511 virtual field trip attendees.

Our Title I School Fund, launched in 2020, offers neighboring low-income schools free access to these interactive learning opportunities, and reimburses schools \$300 for transportation costs. In the 2023-24 school year, we hosted over 1,800 Title I participants -- 18% of the total number of student attendees.

Summer Camp

In June of 2023, HSJ hosted the first ever Time Travelers Summer Camp! Our team of Museum Educators designed and facilitated two weeks of fun-filled activities, leading participants through themes of Historic Innovation and Museum Mysteries. With funding from San Jose's Safe Summer Initiative Grant, all 23 participants attended free of cost.

Public Programs

History San José hosts our own public programs: book talks, gatherings, cultural celebrations, and festivals. These are in addition to the many third-party special events and rentals held at History Park,

This year, we were proud to partner with the Chinese Historical and Cultural Project, the Japanese American Museum of San Jose, the Friends of the Japanese Friendship Garden, the Viet Museum, and Mosaic America, to present the first ever South Bay Asian American and Pacific Islander Festival. The inaugural festival welcomed over 800 visitors, and we can't wait to see how it grows!

In addition to our newest festival, we continued to expand and improve our existing annual programs with the help of growing partnerships, adding a womenowned lowrider show and poetry lounge to our Women's Heritage Day, community booths to San José Roots, and children's activities to Spirit of '45.

Unique public programs this past fiscal year included a live demonstration of wet plate photography, and a book talk with a historical romance author.

History Park

Visitor Experience

History San José couldn't accomplish a fraction of what we do without the help of our dedicated volunteers. This past year,

volunteers logged over 8,526 donated hours!

Our volunteer docents allow us to welcome visitors into the buildings of History Park. With the help of 13 new docents (and our more experienced ones, of course), at least 10,467 people accessed park buildings on the weekends. This is in addition to the nearly 150,000 guests who visit the park annually for regular visits, public programs or special events.

Our Gift Shop reopened on a permanent basis this year, welcoming 4,300+ people through its doors & bringing in over \$11,000 in sales.

The Neon Courtyard at History Park

Two iconic signs from San Jose's neon sign heritage — Orchard Supply Hardware, and Stephen's Meats Dancing Pig — are displayed at History Park, with a third planned for 2025. These signs, once vibrant markers of urban life, are now symbols of the city's history, capturing the imagination of passersby.

Preserving and showcasing them serves as a living testament to San Jose's evolving heritage.

We hope to feature smaller neon signs from local businesses already in our collection in a future "neon courtyard" between the current displays. The courtyard will celebrate the artistic creativity and storytelling represented by neon.



Special Events & Rentals

History San José's Special Events department assists outside organizations & our affiliates with hosting events at History San José sites. History Park welcomed over 50 events and drew an impressive 100,000 visitors. This season highlighted the versatility of our spaces, with events ranging from non-profit fundraisers to city employee picnics, car shows, and cultural festivals. Seven cultural festivals showcased the richness of our community, including Vietnamese, Indian, Portuguese, and Chinese celebrations.



Our affiliates played a key role in activating the park year-round by hosting 21 different educational programs, community workshops, and cultural festivals.

Events such as Scout-O-Rama or the Christmas in the Park Drive-Thru highlighted the capacity of History Park to support major community events. This year reaffirmed our mission to serve as a cultural and community hub, bringing people together through history, heritage, and celebration. Facilities

History Park

History San José's Facilities Department had a highly productive fiscal year, achieving significant progress on maintenance and operational projects including new roofs on the Empire Firehouse, Zanker House, and Markham House.

HSJ maintained strong collaborations with key partners, including Christmas in the Park, Spirit of '45, Italian Family Festa, the Rotary Club BBQ, and others. Throughout the busy event season, we supported event setups by answering infrastructure-related questions and coordinating the movement of equipment to ensure smooth operations.



We communicated with city departments, contractors, and HSJ staff to address disruptions to activities like educational programs and event preparations, often handling last-minute or after-hours communications.

This year, we oversaw routine maintenance, including gutter cleaning, fire system testing, HVAC servicing, and elevator inspections, while also resolving unexpected issues including termite treatment and beehive removal. Notably, a new park wide wi-fi system was installed, supporting the addition of security cameras at the entrance gates.

With the help of our dedicated volunteers, we completed minor maintenance projects around the park: replacing rotten boards on steps and building walls, painting small areas, replacing numerous dead light bulbs, and cleaning up after storm damage.

Regular upkeep included leaf and debris cleanup, weed trimming, occasional grass mowing, and hedge and bush pruning. In addition, we updated displays in the Pacific Hotel gallery to refresh the Valley Memories exhibit for the new year.


